

From May to September 2018 raumlaborberlin will create a visionary, inner-city, offshore-laboratory for collective, experimental learning. With numerous partners we will experiment with knowledge transfers and the formation of transdisciplinary networks to challenge routines and habits of urban practices – Floating University Berlin.

The site is an almost forgotten place in the center of Berlin: An old, concrete rainwater basin right next to the Tempelhof airfield. A third landscape on the verge of disappearing. Here we will build a generic structure, a drilling platform for a scarce urban resource: sensitivity for decision-making.

Students and scientists from more than twenty international universities as well as artists, architects, musicians, and dancers from all over the world will come together with local experts to research and investigate the daily routine of urban life and make proposals to reorganize it. In the territory around the rainwater basin Floating University is looking for contemporary, resilient forms of urban practice with a visionary focus on an unknown future.

In April, students and teachers from Berlin, Europe and elsewhere will collaborate on building the campus: learning spaces, workshops, an auditorium, a performative laboratory tower for experimental water filtration systems, a discursive kitchen, a bar as a protest generator, and a fast food jungle. Spaces are created, for exchanging knowledge within experimental, educational formats. A place where transdisciplinary research teams and diverse positions come together to tackle the complex questions of urban practices.

During three 'Open Weeks' in May, July and September we invite the local and international public to explore the rainwater basin and the campus, as well as to participate in workshops, lectures, seminars, hot tub talks, concerts and performances.





Some Notes #7 'Some Notes' is a conversation series on architecture, crafts and cul-**Conversation** tural practice in transfer between Germany and other countries. The first nine events of the series are focused on Japan. Japanese cultural practice is internationally known and appreciated nowadays. This drives an increased number of young Europeans to move to Japan for their studies or for work. Over there they are mostly part of teams until they return after a few months, sometimes years. How do Japanese cultural practices differ from the practices and methods we are familiar with? How are their current works influenced by their time in Japan?

> Some Notes invites returnees to talk about their personal experiences. During each event, two protagonists will sit with us and share their experiences from their work between the two cultures around personal, subjective impressions and observations - in fact, notes.

Niklas Fanelsa is an architect and founder of the architecture studio Atelier Fanelsa in Berlin. He studied architecture at the RWTH Aachen University and the Tokyo Institute of Technology. The City AGILE It is a perplexing observation, that on a global scale, order and Lecture chaos are not significant factors in the self-organization of cities. Inhabitants get by in any city, as absurd as this might seem to the observer. The lecture focuses on the sociological perspective on this phenomenon and proposes the thesis, that for a city there is a minimal, but in no way simple, complexity that is recognizable in any given situation, and therefore, each situation becomes manageable.

Academy of Listening In various acoustic interventions the Academy of Listening tries to reach from listening to thinking and vice versa. Daniel Dominguez Teruel is programming the academy and inviting artists and nonartists to test out and talk about visions, e.g. with a choir, sound artists, a singing pigeon and lectures on auditory perception and different practices of listening.

Daniel Dominguez Teruel works as a composer on a cross medial level between music, video art, performance and installation. He studied musicology, musical informatics as well as multimedia composition in Freiburg, Karlsruhe, Barcelona and Hamburg. Among other places, he held concerts and installations at ZKM Karlsruhe, ICMC New York, Barcelona, Paris, Musica Viva Lissabon, Greatest Hits Hamburg, EMW Shanghai, Buenos Aires, HAU Berlin, EMAF Osnabrück, Uferstudios Berlin, Kampnagel, Rainy Days Luxemburg, and Hallo Festspiele Hamburg.

Knarf Rellöm, born on Mars, does music with drum machine, synthesizer, chaos pad, guitar and vocals. First musical steps at the age of 3 with a piano, oboe at 4. Moving over to earth, more exactly Dithmarschen in Northern Europe, first punk band " Electric China", later from 1985 on singer and composer of the band "Huah!", released a lot of records, made uncountable tours and collaborations with other musicians such as Jan Delay, Rocko Schamoni, Dj Patex, Viktor Marek, Bernadette La Hengst, and worked on theatre pieces.

FLAGS for the Floating University Andreco

With Andreco, Floating University turns into an imaginary indigenous society created to share experiences and practices that aim to find new thoughts and future scenarios for a sustainable city. Within the workshop participants produce new symbols for the community and space. These symbols will be printed on flags and the grand opening ceremony will be performed with them.

Based on theoretic input about Art and Science in times of Climate Change, participants will analyze the site from an interdisciplinary point of view: artistic, scientific and ecocritic, harvesting data, information and stories around the rainwater basin. After this they will develop new symbols for the community – using minimal abstraction and symbolic drawing techniques, they design and produce the flags themselves with symbolic images. In the end a performance is developed to celebrate the opening of the Floating University and install the community flags on the very top of the floating structures – visible from afar.

Andreco was born in Rome and works as an artist and scientist between Bolgna and New York. He is an environmental engineer and specialized in Teham sustainability within his PhD thesis. His artistic research focuses on the relationship between human and nature, between the built environment and the natural landscape. Since 2000 he has been researching various topics such as anatomy, sustainability, urban planning, ecology and symbolism. Andreco uses many different techniques to present his art, from public installations to videos or murals.

Formatting Observation Benoît Verjat

Floating University will be a multifaceted kaleidoscope of ephemeral forms to capture the possible in times when the most probable dominates the discourse. There will be momentary inventions and inventions of moments. There will be spatial structures without time and structured spaces in time. There will be high tide and low tide with permanent condensation of numerous substances and thoughts. How can we perceive what's happening, and how can we memorize what's worth memorizing?

In a series of workshops with Benoît Verjat we will experiment with forms of observation and interfaces we need to realize and think about. The collection of forms of observation we will develop, will add up to an autonomous parcours of perspectives around the campus.

Two workshops will be held during the Spring Open Weeks:

The first workshop will be about designing a scenario for the parcours exploring the potential of the site and the interfaces between our selves and our surroundings.

The second workshop will be about developing and building the instruments needed, to shift and process the perceptions on the observation parcours.

Benoît Verjat was trained as an interaction designer at HEAR (Strasbourg). In 2015 he participated in SPEAP, an experimental master program in arts and politics led by Bruno Latour. In 2016, he joined 'SciencesPo médialab' as a method designer for humanities. Since 2010 he is part of g-u-i a collective working with institutions, artists and research group using interaction design, editorial practice, graphic design, scenography, in situ actions and performance. He teaches at the 'École Supérieure d'Art' in Nancy since 2011.

Deathless Inception Andreas Krauth (TU Darmstadt) Sabine Zahn

A body-spatial surveillance of specific heterotopias in the urban context: cemeteries. Architect Andreas Krauth and Choreographer Sabine Zahn guide a multidisciplinary group of students through a very specific urban field. The culture of cemeteries is in transformation, not only in Berlin. Places of quiet mourning become vital commons of the civic society. With their deathless initiation as new urban playgrounds for artists, refugees, urban gardeners and other initiatives, cemeteries are the testing ground for a new deal in the city. The seminar is looking for active forms of an interpretation of this historic change from two simultaneous perspectives. Outside in and inside out (or the planners and the choreographers perspective).

Andreas Krauth studied architecture at the Technical University of Munich and UdK Berlin. He lives in Berlin and works as a freelance architect (AK Berlin), working for raumlaborberlin. He is a former scientific assistant of the Chair of Urban Planning and Regional Planning TU München and the Department of Urban Design Karlsruhe Institute of Technology (KIT).

Sabine Zahn is a choreographer based in Berlin. Within her artistic practice she focuses on the mutual influence of bodies and their environment, mainly in the urban realm. She focuses on collaborations with other artists or urban developers to develop participatory formats for artistic and societal education.

Create your own water filters Katherine Ball

In this workshop, we will build filters for Floating University's water system. To be more precise, we will not build the filters, we will grow filters. Plants, fungi, sand, biofilms, molluscs, xylem, water vegetables, sage and special effects are all tested for their filtering properties in a mix of science, Zen relaxation and voodoo magic.

This workshop will be led by Floating University's artist-in-residence, Katherine Ball. Actions of infitiation will include: planting, inoculating, releasing, hatching, igniting, and electrifying.

Workshop participants can join in for a few hours or the entire 3-day workshop, however they like. (No one will be turned away for lack of funds.)

Katherine Ball is a habitat for fungi and bacteria located on planet Earth. Her artistic interventions reimagine the infrastructure of everyday life, and have included: living in an off-grid floating island building mushroom filters to clean a polluted lake, learning the art of biological sabotage in an apprenticeship with nature, and bicycling across the USA looking for small-scale 'solutions' to the climate crisis. Her books include *Not Broken Yet: Life in the Mojave Desert* and *Utopia Walks Away: Infrastructure in Copenhagen, Denmark*. She is the artist-in-residence at Floating University.


FLYING Sanaphoras

Flying Semaphores & Floating Bridges Raul Walch

Since 2015 Raul Walch has developed various flying objects together with refugees, during numerous visits in the area of the Greek borders: kites that fly across borders, or floating lighthouses, that reflect the sunlight to attract the attention of the coast guards and serve as an orientation mark. This workshop and action series will be continued this this year in Berlin. Raul Walch invites the participants of Floating University as well as the inhabitants of the refugee shelter on the Tempelhof airfield and others interested, for his workshop and collective flying experiments. The polymorphic flying objects will float above the fences of the airfield and expand the floating university into the sky.

Raul Walch lives in Berlin. He studied at the Kunsthochschule Berlin-Weißensee and graduated from the Institut für Raumexperimente at the UdK. He continued to work in many international collaborations. From 2015 on he continuously visited the Greek border areas where he developed various flying objects together with refugees.


Impact sound, impulse-response, Feedback, resonance research. In the Workshop of sound artist Philip Leitner and the scaffolding master Uwe Tisch, participants will experiment with the sound of the architecture and will induce audio, with impact sound converters into the scaffolding structure of Floating University.

The specific sound characteristics of the modular, steel scaffolding structure will be explored during the workshop and will serve as the basic material for developing generative compositions – the scaffolding itself functions as acoustic noise transducer, loud-speaker and instrument. Within the practical part of the workshop the fundamentals of real-time-sound-processing, as well as aesthetical and spatial-composition aspects of installation building, specifically sound sculptures, will be learned and implemented.

Philip Leitner is an Austrian musician and computer artist, born 1981 in Graz. He uses piano as well as everyday items for the production of sound and co-ordinates real-time computer post processing, microsounds and prepared piano. His compositions are of aleatory nature, his works are described as modes of operation, not in sounds or notes. Leitner performs solo and with numerous domestic and foreign artists of different backgrounds.

Uwe Tisch works with the Tisch scaffolding firm since 1980, 1988 the took over the business management of Tisch Gerüstbau GmbH in Frankfurt. Since 1993 he is the manager of Gerüstbau Tisch GmbH Berlin. With his standard, to manage technical challenges and extravagant structures with the maximum of workmanship quality he holds up the family traditions of the firm.
