

LEARNSCAPES 2023: UNSEALING FLOATING

The future of the Floating site is always being negotiated, sometimes contested. Floating e.V. follows a vision for a Floating infiltration basin, in which the asphalt base of the basin is replaced with gravel that biologically filter the polluted water so it can be used for swimming and to water neighboring gardens, local parks and graveyards, before seeping into the ground (rather than entering the Spree untreated). Whether this vision is going to be implemented by the landlords and authorities or not, is still unclear. And so is the role of Floating University in this transformation process.

(How) Can Floating University become an active agent of transformation in the process of unsealing and redesigning the rainwater basin? How can the temporary natureculture learning site turn into a hybrid infrastructure with a long-term perspective (an infiltration basin as a bluegreen infrastructure, a learning space, an urban practice campus, an artistic free space laboratory, a cultural venue)? Concepts like the 15 Minute City as well as Sponge City (Schwammstadt) could be examined in relation to Floating.

Unsealing Floating is an open invitation to all visiting student groups to generate knowledge on the topic of unsealing and support Floating University in becoming an agent of transformation, proving expertise in a self-driven spatial transformation and eventually – hopefully – combining an infiltration basin with a learning landscape – through a community of practice. We like to resonate this knowledge within the association as well as with our strategic partners in the city administration.

At Learnscapes, we aim to un-, re- and co-learn. With this in mind, we want to approach the topic of unsealing by collecting a multitude of definitions and practices. Beyond the literal spatial transformation of the rainwater basin, in which Floating is entangled, the act of unsealing can be understood as emancipatory, radical, liberating.

Sous les pavés, la plage! Unsealing can be understood as questioning established planning processes, breaking out of institutional borders and entrenched learning methods, developing new ways of practice-based knowledge production, envisioning alternative futures and narratives.



Unseafood

Un-sea-ling. Un-Sea. Sea. Seafood - the collective term for all edible animals and plants from the sea. Due to efficiency-driven production conditions, artificial additives and long transportation routes, what ends up on our plates today often no longer has much to do with it. So how about we paint a different picture of food from the sea that captures the local context? Julia Klink transforms local ingredients and re-assembles them into a dish that turns a community lunch into a maritime culinary voyage of discovery: Noodles literally become mussels and octopus tubes, king oyster mushrooms become scallops, black lentils become majestic caviar, seaweed and sea asparagus give the plate its green and typical saltiness. Above the shallow waves of the rainwater catchment basin, it almost feels like being by the sea and motivates us to continue working on unsealing topics, because we know: sous les pavés, la plage!



Mid term tacos

The road to unsealing is a long one. Soil drilling is a central part of this, but has not yet taken place at Floating university. We ask ourselves: what is actually hidden there, under the black, hard layer that becomes visible at low water at Floating? We go on a discovery tour with the Mid-Term Tacos and work our way through the different layers in a culinary way: After the hard asphalt layer, we come across sand, concrete sludge and soil until we end up with groundwater and living plants. What does it look like on the plate? Dark mole, black beans and roasted oyster mushrooms are draped on a black, crispy taco. Garnished with blue and green sauce and colourful toppings. After the mid-term tacos, we were full of energy and eager to continue the unsealing process.



The LearnscaPes SYmPosium: Unsealing Floating invited Past, Present and future ParticiPants of the LearnscaPes Programme for two days of workshoPs, talks and get-togethers - an oPPortunity to take a deePer dive into the floating landscaPes of knowledge Production and Practices of un-, co- and re- learning beyond academia. Once again we came together to exchange knowledge - this time on the toPics of soil and water at Floating and beyond - and started shaPing next year's LearnscaPes Programme and its community of Practice.

Soils Blankets and Feuille de terrain [workshop]

However, this is hugely deficient when water is central to approaching a multitude of other urban issues which are present.



Toasts to the Future [Discursive Dinner]

We invited all participants to engage in conversations about the future we want to proclaim at Floating. We slip into the role of air, earth, rainwater, unsealing, swamping, rewilding, reed, dragonflies and frogs. What does our future look like at Floating? We collectively wrote speeches out of those perspectives and toasted to them. Unexpectedly, it becomes concrete when the different perspectives are suddenly served as performative dinner elements. Would you like a little more earth? And a little rainwater and air bubbles on top? How can sealed vegetables be opened to reveal their flavours? Where can they go to rot and go wild? What does an edible reed landscape consist of and what does "frogspawn" taste like? A long, interactive menu as an evening-long program at the end of the season.
